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Skeptic, Seeker, Believer, Disciple, Apostle

Renewal leader Terry Fullam once said, "If your people believe that a church consists primarily of a minister who ministers and a congregation that congregates, they will forever remain in a state of spiritual infancy." How true it is. In the 1950's and '60's churches thrived on models that seemed appropriate to the time: large numbers of people gathering for worship and Sunday School, and perhaps an evening prayer meeting or Bible study on Sunday or Wednesday or both. For two or three decades there was little need to change the basic format. Attendance remained strong for churches that worked hard at a quality worship experience and had some solid teaching for children. Millions of devoted Christians gave countless hours to the Lord's ministry in their local church, and most churches knew the importance of supporting "mission work" internationally, nationally and locally. Today, our world is a richer place for those in that time who faithfully followed Christ and gave of themselves as spouses, parents, church leaders, pastors and missionaries, and the fruit of their labor is a foundation on which we depend today.

But somewhere along the way, the sense of God's calling to every Christian was diluted. The "*priesthood of all believers*" and the "*ministry of all Christians*" got lost. At some point, worship became something out of which I just wanted to "*get something*." We stopped simply attending our local church, and we became experts at "*church shopping*." We ceased answering God's call to mission and discipleship, and instead became expert "*consumers of religious goods and services*." A variety of church growth gurus preached the need to address the "*felt needs*" of those who might attend. We heard of a need to be "*seeker sensitive*," but did little about it. We mainline Protestants became very comfortable with our own group, our own worship, our own theology, our own tradition, our own routine, our own community, our own style and our own culture. As the influence of Jesus Christ and the church waned in the lives of the people, the community and the culture, many began to look elsewhere for meaning and purpose in their lives. And the spiritual infancy of churches began to take a toll on the vibrancy of Christ's Church in the U.S. and elsewhere.

Chris Campbell and I are excited about shepherding FPCA to reverse this long trend, and enabling our church to grow in spiritual maturity in Christ. We desire to see not only our church members, but many outside our fellowship move along the path from *skeptic* to *seeker* to *believer* to *disciple* to *apostle*. And YOU will be the ones to make it happen. We have a number of skeptics in our midst, who really don't believe the essence of the gospel message. We want to give them opportunity to ask and answer questions and become a genuine seeker. From there, learning to trust in Jesus is what makes one a believer. A believer who is serious then begins to understand and follow Jesus, which is the core of being a disciple. As a disciple listens to the call of Jesus, that person joins God's mission and is sent out by the Lord as an apostle.

This is a change from business as usual. It will require that we focus on Christ and give of our time, commitment, prayer, hard work, serious ministry, financial resources, faith, hope and love. Our Stewardship Commitment Sunday is November 13, when we will come forward to commit ourselves anew to Jesus Christ and his missional call to each one of us. We are praying for our best Stewardship Commitment ever, with many growing to give a tithe or more of their income. Will you prayerfully consider joining us in this endeavor for God's kingdom and the glory of the Lord? You will not regret it.

I Am N Study

This fall, I have enjoyed facilitating a class with the Foundations Sunday school class. It is called *I Am N* and is published by the Voice of the Martyrs.

When Islamic State (ISIS) militants moved into northern Iraq, they began identifying Christian-owned property with the Arabic letter ن (nun) or “n” painted on homes, businesses and churches. This single letter conveyed the powerful accusation that the occupants were people who followed Jesus of Nazareth rather than Islam. To be labeled “n” in a community dominated by Muslim extremists is a life-changing identity.

Since 2003, more than two-thirds of the 1.5 million Christians who lived in Iraq have fled, emigrated, or been killed. Many families have lost loved ones. Some families have known when their loved ones died and were able to bury them. Other families have no idea if their loved ones are dead; they have simply disappeared. These losses are very difficult to bear, yet our fellow Christians persevere.

Each week, we watch a brief DVD clip of Christians in Iraq sharing their experiences of persecution at the hands of ISIS. The themes of sacrifice, courage, joy, perseverance, forgiveness, and faithfulness are explored through discussion and reflection. It has challenged us as individuals to think, “What would I do? How would I respond if I were in those circumstances?” We have also been challenged to explore how we can help.

To say, “I Am N” is a declaration and commitment to remember, to pray for, and to stand with persecuted Christians everywhere. This is not a class to delve into partisan politics, but instead learn about the lives and sacrifices made in the midst of unbelievable circumstances. If your Sunday school class would like to take up this six-week study, please let me know. It would be an honor to share these experiences with your class.

Elementary Sunday School

Honor is a response to the character of God.

Chances are if you have kids in sports or competitions of any kind, you have a growing collection of ribbons and medals, sashes and badges, certificates, trophies, or plaques. Some might hang on your walls or sit propped up on shelves somewhere. But if we’re honest, others get stuffed into a drawer and eventually thrown out. These were so important when they first came into our homes, but at some point they just lost their value. All those awards and medals can only mean so much, because honor has a deeper meaning.

People should not just be honored because of what they do; they should primarily be honored because of who they are. Stuff will lose value over time, but not people. At its core, honor is seeing people the way God sees people. We’re naturally wired to put ourselves first, but honor is the opposite of self-centeredness. It is something that flows from your relationship with God. In a sense, one of the best ways we can HONOR God, is by honoring those who reflect the image of God.

Throughout Scripture we see how much God loves us:

- He created us in His image.
- He knows the number of hairs on our heads.
- We are fearfully and wonderfully made.
- He pursued a relationship with us even when we wanted nothing to do with Him.
- He sent His only Son to pay for our sins to make an eternal relationship with Him possible.
- And He did all of this for us without us even asking.

Jesus was the ultimate example of someone who showed others their value.

When Jesus came here, He showed us how to love and show honor to those around us. He taught us to love our enemies, care for the “least of these,” and become the servants of all who puts others’ needs before our own.

That’s why it’s important for us to help our kids and families discovery more about **honor - letting someone know you see how valuable they really are.**

Our memory verse for November comes from Romans 12. Throughout the chapter, Paul casts a vision for the church and how they can live as people transformed by God’s Holy Spirit. In **Romans 12:10**, we read, **“Love one another deeply. Honor others more than yourselves.” (NIrV)** As kids memorize this verse, we hope they understand that honor includes seeing others as God sees them. When kids start doing that, they will be more willing to show God’s love to others and put their needs ahead of their own.


Kids Night Out and Strengthening Your Family
