## Carter Connection: Where Challenges and Opportunities Intersect

Raise your hand if you or your children attended Carter Junior High. Today, Carter seems to many to be a different place than it was years ago. However, it does still have students charged with the task of learning, and teachers and staff charged with the task of teaching and guiding these seventh and eighth graders. And this school is still our nearest neighbor. How can we love our neighbor?

Carter Principal, Reny Lizardo, gave us some statistics about his school in a recent gathering of community members that included the Chamber of Commerce, City of Arlington, Mission Arlington, eight churches, Arlington Police, and AISD:

- 1,100 students
- 97% of students qualify for free or reduced lunch
- 25% mobility rate with transience affecting the rolls daily
- 60% of the students ride buses to school
- 13 to 15 buses serve Carter, compared with 3 to 4 at other schools
- Carter area extends east, past Highway 360, an area that includes many hotels and apartments
- 80% Hispanic
- 14% African American
- Parent events draw 50 to 100 parents due to multiple jobs, lack of transportation, language barrier
- No PTA or booster organizations due to the same reasons; hence, no fundraising

A positive: Carter had the second highest performance among 40 Texas schools of similar demographics.

The passionate and articulate student council has raised awareness about the eroding of their athletic field by Johnson Creek. The resulting restrictions on use of the field have ruled out all home games on their own turf this year. Home games are played at Sam Houston, eliminating the presence of a home crowd, as students, limited in transportation options, are unable to attend.

*Challenge:* anything that calls for special effort or dedication

*Opportunity:* a combination of circumstances favorable for the purpose

It would seem that the great challenges next door present us with great opportunities. Happily, various groups and individuals are reaching out to become involved in supporting Carter:

- # We  Carter is the group of community members mentioned above.
- Carter Athletic Field Team is a subteam exploring a solution for the athletic field.
- Sue Lavender has organized a welcome back to school breakfast for the staff for several years.
- Adrian Rodriguez, our Director of Youth, goes to the school several times a week and has growing relationships with students and staff.
- Russell Farnell goes to Carter a couple of times a week to help with choir and music programs.
- Russell and Jane Leathem will take the choir to participate in Youth Cue in Waco February 24 to 26.
- Allen and Carole Ray were chaperones on the first field trip Carter students have taken in years.
- The Rays, Bob Dawson and others have assisted students challenged by reading at testing times.
- Isobel and David Peden, Ozzie Garza and others have assisted with August student registration.

This involvement is very exciting! Let's love our neighbors with the steadfastness with which the Lord has loved us. Please pray for this ministry as we seek what the Lord has in store for Carter. Stay tuned for future updates on challenges and opportunities and ways to get involved.

### Preschool Sunday School

# Elementary Sunday School

## Forgiveness is a reflection of the character of God.

Throughout Scripture, we are reminded about God’s grace and forgiveness.

- God makes us white as snow. (Isaiah 1:18)
- God’s mercies are new every morning. (Lamentations 3:22-23)
- God is faithful and just to forgive our sins. (1 John 1:9)

When our relationship with God was broken beyond repair, God offered His only Son as the way to forgive us and restore the broken relationship.

Since we are created in God’s image, we have the ability to offer forgiveness when people in our lives hurt us. God’s love in us makes it possible for us to forgive others and work towards fixing our own relationships that break down from time to time.

Jesus made it possible for us to have God’s forgiveness.



God’s showed us just how much He cares about forgiveness when He made the ultimate sacrifice and sent Jesus to pay the price for our sin. While sin separates us from God, He offers grace and forgiveness as a gift for us to receive. We have been forgiven for so much, it’s only right that we turn to those in our lives and offer forgiveness to them in return.

That’s why we think it’s important for us to help our kids and families discover more about Forgiveness—deciding that someone who has wronged you doesn’t have to pay.

Our Memory Verse for March comes from Colossians 3:13: *“Put up with one another. Forgive one another if you are holding something against someone. Forgive, just as the Lord forgave you.”* (NIV)

This verse, from Paul’s letter to the church at Colossi, reminds us not only that God forgave our sins, but also that we should forgive others instead of holding grudges against one another.

# Opportunities for Giving to Those in Significant Need



## New Books in the Library




Two new books in the FPCA library are difficult to read, but very rewarding, inspiring and informative. They both concern the terrible events that we know as the Holocaust.



**Auschwitz #34207** is the true story of Joe Rubinstein’s harrowing years in the prison camps in Germany where he was imprisoned from 1942 to 1945. He avoided the fate of so many, including his family, by a series of small but significant and fortunate events. His survival seems to be attributed to his determination, his cleverness and his faith in God. The rest of the story is as remarkable as Joe’s years in the camps. He married a lovely Christian girl, immigrated to America and became one of New York’s leading shoe designers. Nancy Sprowell Geise interviewed Joe for two years and published the book in 2014, when he was a joyful 93 years old. Nancy is a friend of Betsy McDermott.

**50 Children – One Ordinary American Couple’s Extraordinary Rescue Mission into the Heart of Nazi Germany** is a true story written by Steve Pressman about his wife’s maternal grandparents, Gil and Eleanor Kraus. In January of 1939, the couple was living a comfortable life in Philadelphia. Gil was commissioned by a national Jewish fraternal organization, Brith Shalom, to bring to America 50 Jewish children who were living in danger in Hitler’s Reich. Once Gil agreed to this mission, he and Eleanor worked tirelessly to find sponsors for the 50 children and to prepare the mounds of paperwork necessary because of America’s stringent immigration regulations. Then they traveled to Germany in the spring, a most dangerous journey for a Jewish couple. Because of their unshakable determination to bring back the 50 children, and with the help of people in America and Germany, they did accomplish that task. It is an amazing and inspirational story written in a very clear and readable voice.



Both of these books can be checked out of the FPCA library. Look for them in the New Book section, which is across from the door nearest the Red Hall.

# An Addition to the Discipleship Team's Annual Report

The Indagators Class is currently studying “The Holy Land Revealed,” as presented in a lecture series by archaeologist Dr. Jodi Magness of the Department of Religious Studies of the University of North Carolina. The series is accompanied by a study guide and offered through The Great Courses. Within the last year, the class has also completed a 24-week study of “The Old Testament,” as presented by Dr. Amy-Jill Levine of the Vanderbilt University Divinity School and a 6-week study of “The Life and Work of C.S. Lewis,” as presented in a lecture series by Rev. Dr. Larry Thomas that the class co-sponsored with the Theological Inquiries Class.

## Church Building Rites Planned In Arlington

Arlington, Sept. 26.—The new \$350,000 church and education building for the Arlington First Presbyterian Church will be dedicated this week.


The official dedication will be at 11 a. m. Sunday with Dr. Hoytt Boels of Denton, executive of the Synod of Texas taking part as guest preacher. Dr. Jasper Manton of Dallas, Stated Clerk of the Synod of Texas also will be present.

At 3 p. m. Sunday there will be special services for the dedication of memorial gifts and furnishings. Rev. Charles L. Dickey of St. Andrew's Church in Austin will be the guest preacher. Rev. Dickey is a former pastor of the Arlington church.

Officers of the church will conduct the guests on a complete tour of the building after the afternoon services.

The four-day dedication services will open at 7 p. m. Thursday in the main sanctuary when the congregation of the church will give a silent prayer of personal dedication.

From 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. Friday there will be open house. The Women's Association of the church will serve refreshments.
