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The Despair that Became the Foundation of Civilization

Hope was lost. Despair was rampant. Fear gripped their community. Jesus’ disciples were scattered and scared, fearing for their lives. Their Master had been brutally beaten, crucified, and quickly buried in a borrowed tomb before the Sabbath began at sundown Friday. They were convinced that Jesus was indeed God’s promised Messiah, and Jesus himself had accepted that title. But now, all that was in doubt. Crucifixion was connected with curse, not blessing or authority or deliverance. No one had ever imagined that the Messiah could be crucified.



Some women went to anoint Jesus’ body early on Sunday, after the Sabbath had ended. But they were initially upset, because the stone was rolled away from the tomb, and the body was missing. Who had stolen the body? Some men in dazzling clothes standing nearby asked them, “Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen.

Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again.” They remembered his words; then, the women ran to tell it to the eleven. But it seemed to the eleven apostles an idle tale (Luke 24:5-12). Peter and John ran to check it out, and, John, the younger of the two, got there first. They found the stone was rolled back, the head cloth that had covered Jesus’ face was rolled up in a place by itself, and the body wrappings were still wrapped, but empty of a body. How could that be? (John 20:1-10)

As Mary Magdalene continued to weep outside the tomb, Jesus appeared to her, saying, “Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek?” At first, she thought him to be the gardener, and asked where the body was placed. Then Jesus called her name: “Mary!” She turned, seeing Jesus, and came to him, saying, “Teacher!!” Jesus urged her not to cling to him but to go and tell his brothers that he was alive (John 20:11-18). Later that evening, Jesus appeared to the group of gathered disciples and said, “Peace be with you.” He showed them his hands that bore the nails, and his side that received the lance of the sword. He went on to say, “Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.” He breathed on them and said, “Receive the Holy Spirit.”

The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ (the Messiah) has had a more profound influence on world civilization than any other event or person in history, by far. The magnitude of Jesus’ continued presence and influence in every area of life around the globe is difficult to overstate. Where there is little to no influence of Jesus,

there is a longing and a need for it. While this may seem politically incorrect to say, there is a strong case to be made for continuing to share Jesus with everyone around the world. While Christians have involved themselves in evil practices at various points in history, that evil cannot be attributed to the influence and Spirit of the One who is Crucified and Risen, but can only be a perversion of his life, teaching, passion, crucifixion and resurrection. At Easter, we marvel in gratitude to Him who died for our sins and was raised for our justification. May we, in humility, give thanks to the Lord who so graciously rescues us daily. Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed!

I want to give a massive thank you to several groups of people for your kindness, sacrifices, and commitment as seen given over the past month. First, I want to thank Suzie McCoy, Coleman Sanger, and Roger and Diana Young for attending the Fellowship Community's National Gathering with me in Tampa. (And thank you to the session for sponsoring the cost of their attendance!) It was a great couple days and I got to reconnect with colleagues who are scattered all over the country. The plenary theme was Deep and Wide: Making Missional Disciples. It is impossible to boil down four greatly informative talks to a sentence or two, but I will try. The early church (pre-Constantine) was greatly effective at creating disciples and literally changing the historical landscape of their day. This was done primarily through discipleship within households: immediate family, extended family, neighbors, servants, business partners, and so on – ranging between 20 and 50 people). They lived, worked, played, and worshiped together, but they were also on mission together for Christ. Our speaker made the case that this is the size group we, as the Church, have gotten away from when, historically, it had the greatest impact. It is similar to the effectiveness seen in countries like China. I am hoping they will make those presentations available to stream so that I do not further butcher its greatness. Dr. Mark Roberts from Fuller Theological Seminary led us through a Bible study on the book of Ephesians. And we expressed various styles of worship. And before we could fully unpack (bags and the content), it was time to fly home.

The day after I returned, my wife, Chelsea, underwent a surgical procedure to repair her abdomen. Apparently, small women giving birth to giant babies can take a certain toll. This was certainly the case. Friends from the Foundations Sunday school class, the Preschool, and others were kind in providing meals, inviting Colton over to play, and prayerful support. For that we are grateful. Chelsea continues to recover without complications. It will just take some time to get back to our "normal." Thank y'all!

We have one of the best jobs in the world! We get to share with preschoolers that Jesus is the best! What an honor and a privilege.

Elementary Sunday School

Humility is a response of the character of God.

God has no beginning and no end. God is the creator and sustainer of the universe. He deserves all of our worship and praise for what He has done and continues to do in our lives.

On the other hand, we are humans, created by God. And while we are the crowns of God's creation, we are nothing without our Creator God.

Yet so often, we act like we are God. We allow our pride to take over and forget that any of our strengths or accomplishments would not exist without God. The only proper response in light of God's greatness is to respond with humility in our interactions with the people around us.

Jesus is the ultimate example of humility.

Jesus is the Son of God. And in the beginning, Jesus was part of creating the heavens and the earth. And as the Son of God, there is nothing in Heaven or on earth that isn't under Jesus' command. Yet Jesus chose to become one of us. He was born as a baby and walked among us. He developed calloused hands as He worked in a carpenter's shop. The dirt of the road caked His feet as He traveled to show love to others. Jesus willingly left the majesty and glory of Heaven to laugh and cry as He fully became a human.

Jesus' ultimate act of humility on Earth was His sacrificial death. He could have called down an angel army to protect Him, but instead, allowed Himself to be wrongly accused and arrested. He could have been worshipped with a gold crown and royal robes, but instead wore a crown of thorns. Jesus deserved praise and adoration, but sacrificed Himself for us.

We live in a world that's all about putting ourselves first. Jesus lived in a world like that too. He could have looked out for Himself, called 10,000 angels to come and rescue Him. But He didn't. Out of His love for us He chose the humble route and put us first. It cost Him everything.

Putting others first will cost you something: your time or money. Maybe it will cost you some pride. But when we choose to follow Jesus with our lives, believing that His death and resurrection made it possible for us to be right with God, the least we can do is put others first even if it's a bit uncomfortable and cost us something.

We think it's important, especially at Easter, for us to help our kids and families discover more about humility—putting others first by giving up what you think you deserve. Our memory verse for April comes from Philippians 2:3: *Don't do anything only to get ahead. Don't do it because you are proud. Instead, be humble. Value others more than yourselves.* (NIRV)

This verse is part of a passage that describes Jesus' humility. Jesus left everything He deserved to humble Himself to save us. As we respond to Jesus' love, we can show humility as we love on those around us.

As we celebrate Jesus' life, death, and resurrection this Easter season, we'll be taking a closer look at the way humility shows up throughout the end of Jesus' time on earth.

The First Tithe

In Genesis 14:19ff, the mysterious priest Melchizedek blesses Abram (or Abraham) and God Most High, the maker of heaven and earth. Abram then gave to the priest one tenth of everything he had, a tithe. The Lord then came to Abram in a vision, saying, “Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.” Abram complains that he does not yet have an heir. The Lord took Abram outside and said, “Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.” Then the Lord said to Abram, “So shall your descendants be.” And Abram believed the Lord. The name “Abram” means “exalted ancestor.” But Abram was later (chapter 17) named “Abraham,” which means “ancestor of a multitude.”

Today, Jews, Muslims, and Christians all count Abraham as their ancestor, or about 3.8 billion people out of the 7.5 billion people on our planet, just over half of the people alive today. Abraham became known as a friend of God, one who believed in the Lord. And the Lord's promise to Abraham about his descendants has been fulfilled beyond his wildest dreams, a fulfillment, of course, that extended well beyond his mortal life. That promise to Abraham came after he had given a tithe, ten percent of his income, not expecting a reward, but nevertheless receiving a most amazing one.

The New Testament, also, is not shy about promising rewards to those who are generous, indicating that “you will be enriched in every way for your great generosity” (2 Corinthians 9:11). At FPCA, we depend upon people who are growing in their faith in the Lord. As Christians mature in faith, they grow in their generosity, and may move from giving to the Lord's work one half of one percent of their income (usually a few hundred dollars, annually) to growing towards giving a tithe or ten percent of income (often a few or several thousand dollars, annually). This growth by Christians is what enables us to fulfill the ministry to which the Lord is calling us. As we face a challenging first year with a full staff, some major mission projects, and several expensive repairs to our building, we are praying for our congregation to grow in faith, in maturity, and in generosity. Will you pray with us for God's provision? May the Lord bless each of you in your generosity even as Abraham was blessed beyond his dreams!

Because of their interest, the door was open to share the gospel with these students, and to help bring a new dimension of worship through song to those singers in our group who are believers.

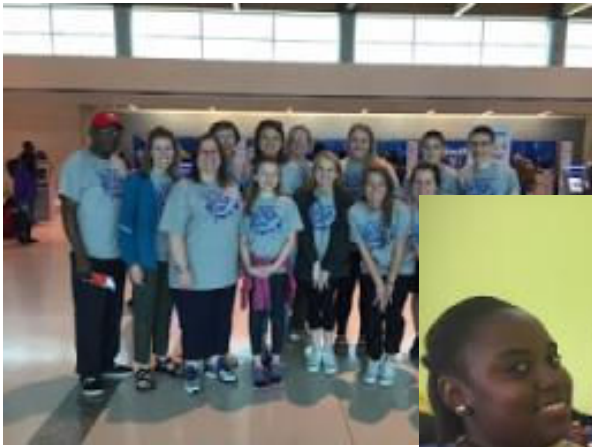
