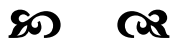

Comments for Contemplation

The Beginning of the End 2 Kings 18:1–12; Isaiah 6:1–10, 53:1–10

1. I needed to know the words of James and Peter, “God opposes the proud, and but gives grace to the humble. Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, so that he may exalt you in due time.” This is true not only of individuals. The pride of nations also goes before their fall. Perhaps it is part of what is happening to us in the United States in these difficult, and morally confused times, which may be actually partly the result of our own pride and _____.
2. Amos warned them of a coming destruction and doom. Remember that Amos prophesied from about 760-750 B.C. and about 25-28 years later, in 722 B.C. the things of which he warned came to pass, when the mighty Assyrian Empire succeeded in crushing the capital city of Samaria after a three year siege, and sent the inhabitants of the northern kingdom of Israel into exile. King Shalmaneser V was the Assyrian king who began the siege on _____, but he was killed in battle and his successor, Sargon II had to finish the job.
3. 2 Kings 19:35 indicates a devastating defeat of the Assyrians when the Lord struck down 185,000 of their soldiers. Some people have connected this incident with a report by the ancient Greek historian Herodotus, writing in the fifth century B.C., who told of an Assyrian defeat on the borders of Egypt because of a sudden onslaught of field mice chewing through their bowstrings and their _____ equipment, and perhaps carrying the plague with them as well.
4. But here is what is the most important statement: he trusted in the Lord the God of Israel. He held fast to the Lord; he did not depart from following him but kept the commandments that the Lord had commanded Moses. Hezekiah did not bow before the king of Assyria, but he rebelled and would not serve him or give up defending Jerusalem. After a long series of unfaithful kings in both Judah and Israel, south and north, King _____ is a breath of fresh air.
5. And Isaiah gets it, just as we should or at least, we will one day, get it, when he says, “Woe is me, I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!” So here we have the essence and the beginning of worship: A sense of the utter holiness and apart-ness of the God that we worship, of our unworthiness to stand before this God, and a _____ of our sin in the presence of God and God’s holiness.
