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Walking with the Lord in the Holy Land

The Context: I had hoped for an opportunity to visit the Holy Land (the land of Israel/Palestine) for the better part of 46 years, starting when I first became a Christian. When this chance to go there with some of our best friends of almost 30 years presented itself, it was one that Betsy and I could not pass up. Our good friends, Fred and Denise Gardner, (see photo) were going with their church from Steamboat Springs, Colorado, and told us of openings on their trip. One of Betsy's best friends from Fort Collins, Colorado (where we served for 23 years), Jennifer DeMario, was also able to come with her mother, Daunine Heath. In total we were a group of 31. So from April 29 to May 11, 2019, we embarked on the trip of a lifetime, which proved to be both spiritually inspiring and edifying.



I am somewhat of an archaeological geek, fascinated by early history, ancient ruins, and walking in the paths of famous people in the distant past, especially the path of our Savior, Jesus of Nazareth. Ironically, we viewed Nazareth, the place of Jesus' childhood and early adulthood, only from a distance, seeing it on a faraway hill, and not up close. Nearly every other famous site where Jesus was present we got

to see in living color, and walked the ground where Jesus trod. Because we visited over 40 sites in 10 days, I have decided to break up my recollection into 4 or more parts, highlighting the most important and fascinating parts. It is my prayer that your faith in the Lord will be strengthened as mine has been.

Southern Israel/Palestine and the Negev Desert: A "Tel" is a mound formed by generations of people living on the same site for hundreds or thousands of years. On our first day we visited **Tel Beth-Shemesh**, dating back to the Canaanite period (12th century B.C.), and named for the sun goddess Shemesh. It is where the tribe of Levi settled, the Ark of the Covenant traveled, and where a battle between Amaziah, king of Judah, and Jehoash, king of Israel, happened (Joshua 21:16; 1 Samuel 6; 2 Kings 14:11ff). The most ancient iron workshop in the world was discovered here in 2003. We then visited the **Elah Valley** where David fought Goliath (1 Sam. 17:2, 19); we gathered smooth stones from the nearby wadi, as David had done. **Tel Mareshah**, is mentioned as a conquered city in Joshua 15:44, a city fortified by king Rehoboam (2 Chron. 14:9-10), and warned by the prophet Micah (1:15) of their coming Assyrian oppression. In the inter-testamental period of the



Maccabean revolt (167-164 B.C.), it was the scene of a great Maccabean victory over the Edomites (2 Macc. 12:32-38, Apocrypha).

One of the most impressive ancient sites we saw was **Lachish**. It was first occupied during the Pottery Neolithic period (about 5000 B.C., some 7000 years ago!), and then saw major development during the Early Bronze Age (3300-3000 B.C.). This early Canaanite settlement came under Egyptian influence during the Middle Bronze Age (1650-1200 B.C.) and is mentioned in the Amarna letters (Egyptian clay tablets, 1360 B.C.). Joshua captured it and executed its king (Joshua 10:26, 32, about 1200 B.C.). King Rehoboam of Judah used it to repel Egyptian and Philistine attacks (about 920 B.C., 2 Chron. 11:9). A century later, king Amaziah of Judah was killed at **Lachish** (2 Kings 14:19).

In 701 B.C., **Lachish** resisted when Sennacherib of Assyria invaded, but ultimately fell to

the brutal Assyrian leader (2 Kings 18:13-17, Isaiah 36). Miraculously, Sennacherib was unable then to defeat King Hezekiah and capture Jerusalem, perhaps due to the Lord's use of a "pestilential sickness" (Josephus, Ja. 10.17.21), or a plague of field mice (Herodotus 2.141). For the faithful, it was the Lord who saved Hezekiah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem (2 Chronicles 32:22; 2 Kings 19:32-36), killing off thousands in the Assyrian army, and giving the southern kingdom of Judah another 114 years to exist, until its fall to Nebuchadnezzar and the Babylonians in 586 B.C. (Jeremiah 34:7). **The Lachish Letters** were an amazing archaeological discovery at **Lachish** in 1935, firsthand documents of the political and military situation for the Jews in Judah just prior to Nebuchadnezzar's destruction of Jerusalem, confirming some of Jeremiah's observations (Jeremiah 34:7, 38:4). Fascinating stuff!!

Enough? That was our first day in Israel. Much more to come.

Last month, I shared an article I read called "5 Beginner Mistakes – Advice from a Seasoned Pitmaster" and how I believe these relate to ministry. Each month we will look at a different one.



1. Not Branching Out Early Enough

2. Over-Seasoning: You probably have a lot of spices in your kitchen. When you get started with grilling or smoking meat, you will be tempted to use them all, probably even at the same time! More spice means more flavor, right? Well, not exactly. In most cases, salt and pepper is all you really need to bring out the flavor that's already in the meat... Start small, and go from there. Try adding one spice at a time, and see what works with what.

When it comes to smoking meat, this was one of the great revelations I experienced early on. For most cooks, salt and pepper is all it takes. In the church world, pastors and church leaders can be guilty of this at times. We read an exciting book. We attend a stirring seminar. There is a new program out there. If one is good, then all of them combined must be great! As Dave Ramsey and others teach, KISS. Keep It Simple Stupid – no offense. Try one thing at a time and make sure it is compatible with our flavor profile. After all, Jesus says, "You are the salt of the earth." Not some whacky rub with 87 secret ingredients.


Caring for God's People through the Social Media Ministry of First Presbyterian Church of Arlington (FPCA)

What is the hope for the person who is facing a battle with brain cancer? What is the hope for the person who is facing suicidal thoughts and had attempted suicide not long ago? What is the hope for a family struggling to pay the bills and pay the mortgage without a job? What would you do in these situations? Or, more to the point, what would you do if you knew that your neighbor was facing one of these battles?

The brain cancer story is the case of "Valerie." (I am changing their names to respect their privacy). Valerie contacted our church on October 4th, 2017, when she saw an ad on Facebook offering prayers for those facing health issues. That is also the case of "Laurie" who attempted suicide 6 months ago, and was struggling with suicidal thoughts when she saw an ad on Facebook on March 4th, 2018, sponsored by FPCA, offering hope through a prayer. That is also the case of "Julia." Julia contacted FPCA asking for prayers because she was concerned if she could keep up with her bills and was also asking prayers for "safety" for her son who "is going overseas in June." She also saw an ad on Facebook, sponsored by this congregation, when she read these words: "I Want To Pray For You."

Situations similar to these, or even worse, are encountered on a daily basis by the Social Media Ministry at FPCA. Since August 2017 more than 527 people from our community,



people from our neighborhood, often in desperate need, have directly contacted our church through Social Media asking for **prayers.** This ministry has responded to each one of them with a written prayer, a devotional and a word of comfort. Every Wednesday when they open their e-mails or their Facebook account, they encounter a word of faith and a seed of hope. As I write this short article, our "virtual hand" has reached more than 3,683 people in the first fifteen days (!) of May 2019 alone (a total 20,000 were reached in the whole year of 2018). When scrolling through their Facebook feed, they encounter a church concerned with their problems, open to hearing them and committed to pray for them. They see hope, love and care from people who are committed to Jesus Christ. They see a light, not hidden under the table, but a light of faith and hope, the light that our Lord Jesus has taught us to put on the table.

This is only a fraction of how God has used the Social Media Ministry to accomplish FPCA's mission of "transforming life by glorifying God, following Jesus, and loving our

neighbor." May the Lord continue to touch these souls as our prayers help to change their lives.

Pentecost Offering






