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Walking with the Lord in the Holy Land

Southern Israel/Palestine: We saw the excavations at Tel **Beer-sheba**, located within a prominent city in southern Israel. Abraham had a well there that was seized by servants of Abimelech, King of Gerar, but a covenant was made between Abraham and Abimelech, and that place was named **Beer-sheba**, meaning, "the well of the oath" (Genesis 21:22-32). Earliest settlement of this location dates to 3400-3100 B.C. and it is mentioned at least ten times in the Old Testament (OT). Tel **Arad** is not far from there, mentioned at least six times in the OT, and given in a list of defeated Canaanite kings (Joshua 12:14). A Jewish temple similar to Solomon's was discovered at **Arad**, and its use dates from the 11th to 7th century B.C.

Wilderness of Zin (2 photos)

The 12 spies passed through **Zin** when they went up to view Canaan (Numbers 13:21), and the Israelites, also, in the exodus (Exodus 17:7, Numbers 20). This particular canyon is fascinating and ends at a

spring that seems to come from the rock. The wild ibex seemed very friendly.







Masada is to the Jews what the Alamo is to Texans. It was the last stronghold of a group of Jewish rebels (the Sicarii) who fled Jerusalem after its utter destruction by the Romans in A.D. 70 (predicted by Jesus, Luke 21:5-24) in the First Jewish-Roman War (A.D. 66-73). Roman General Flavius Silva took 3 years to build a siege ramp to root out the Jewish rebels, and on April 16, A.D. 73 when the fortress was finally breached, the Romans found 960 men, women and children who chose to be killed by the hands of their own families and friends rather than surrender to the Romans. Modern Israeli soldiers are now commissioned at Masada.

Masada (2 photos)

While there is no Biblical record of the high rock fortress at **Masada** (east of Arad, near the Dead Sea), the Jewish historian Josephus tells how it plays a prominent role in 1st century A.D. Judaism. Initially built as a fortress by the Hasmoneans in the first century B.C., Herod the Great expanded the structures, built two palaces, and fortified it significantly from 37-31 B.C. He intended to use it to escape a revolt, if needed, and his family used it occasionally, but Herod himself never stayed there.




The Dead Sea and the Scrolls at Qumran (2 photos)

Most of our group floated in the **Dead Sea**, called the Salt Sea, Eastern Sea, or the Sea of Arabah and referred to many times in the OT. It is not mentioned in the NT. The Dead Sea is bordered by Jordan to the east and Israel to the west. It's shore is 1,412 feet below sea level, the lowest point on planet earth. It is almost 1000 feet deep, and has 34.2% salinity, ten times as salty as the ocean. You can read a magazine while floating in it. Plants and animals do not live in such water, hence its name.

The **Dead Sea Scrolls** were discovered in the caves of **Qumran** (see picture, on the NW shore of the Dead Sea) in 1947 by Bedouins. Many believe the Jewish sect of the Essenes lived and studied in these caves from the late 2nd century B.C. to about A.D. 68. Over 900 scrolls were eventually discovered, and they are the most important ancient texts of the Old Testament that exist.

other words, over 900 years, there was not a single substantive difference in content of the largest book in the Bible that needed changing. It gives you an idea of how meticulous were the Jewish scribes who copied these texts in ancient times, and how trustworthy are our English translations of these ancient texts. What we are reading today in the Bible are the best attested ancient books in the world, and we can be assured that the texts we are reading today are almost exactly the same texts that were read almost 2000 years ago. Praise be to God!

The Jordan River and Jericho

About half of our group of 31 decided to get baptized (or to "reaffirm their baptismal covenant") in the **Jordan River** in a spot, just north of the Dead Sea, believed to be near where John the Baptist baptized many Jews, including our Lord Jesus Christ. It was a moving scene, one where folks were recommitting their lives to Christ and seeking to The most incredible find was the great Isaiah scroll (see picture), a complete text of all 66 chapters of the prophetic book, written in Hebrew, on sheepskin, and copied before the end of the 2nd century B.C.! It predates by 900 years the next oldest manuscript of Isaiah of much use to translators. When the two were compared, scholars expected hundreds, and perhaps thousands of differences would need to be reconciled for Bible translation. Instead they found 14 differences: 11 spelling differences, and 3 names of towns that had changed! In



receive anew the power of God's Holy Spirit in their lives. It was thrilling to see the joy and the dedication of these disciples.

Jericho is one of the oldest cities in the Holy Land, dating back to 9,000 B.C. It is best known for being the first city miraculously conquered by Joshua and the Israelites in about 1200 B.C. as they entered the Promised Land. Jericho today is the home of thousands of Palestinians, and since we were there on a Friday, the day of rest for Muslims, we only got a brief tour of the town on our bus. Still, imagining all the civilizations that had been established there, and knowing Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan, and the man traveling "from Jerusalem to Jericho," it was exciting to actually be there. Next month, we share about Jesus' ministry in Galilee.

A Fallen Officer and a Simple Prayer


A Grand Prairie police officer has died after a crash on the President George Bush Turnpike Friday morning, June 7.

Officer A.J. Castaneda, 38, was killed after a driver lost control and hit him while he was running traffic enforcement at 10:40 a.m. Castaneda was a five-year veteran of the force. He worked previously with the U.S. Coast Guard for eight years and Tarrant County Sheriff's Department for six years.

Castaneda was named 2015 Grand Prairie Patrol Officer of the Year and a 2017 North Texas Police Chiefs Association Officer of the Month.

I think many of you may have seen this tragedy that brought together a community. But what does this have to do with our Social Media Ministry?

On June 17, as usual, I sent a prayer to the members of this Ministry, part of that prayer says "I pray that You [God] stay with her, giving strength to endure any hard situation that she may be



facing."

Three hours after the prayer was sent I got a reply back from a woman, who is part of my prayer list, thanking us, thanking this ministry because that prayer "was felt." That morning, she had just buried her former partner AJ Castaneda (see conversation below). For many this could be just a "coincidence," but for me, God is using us to comfort and bless people.

Officer Castaneda leaves behind his parents and two children, one of them with special needs for whom he travelled internationally to find experimental treatments.

I'm still praying for his family and friends.

This is only a fraction of how God has used the Social Media Ministry to accomplish FPCA's mission of "transforming life by glorifying God, following Jesus, and loving our neighbor." May the Lord continue to touch these souls as our prayers help to change their lives.

We are continuing our discussion around the article I read called "5 Beginner Mistakes – Advice from a Seasoned Pitmaster" and how I believe these relate to ministry. Each month we will look at a different one.

- 1. Not Branching Out Early Enough
- 2. Over-Seasoning

3. Overloading The Cooking Chamber: There are smokers that can hold 8 racks of ribs without a sweat. If you just got your first smoker, this is probably not the case. When you place too much meat in a smoker, you compromise on a number of things. For one, more cold meat in the chamber means the heat will be harder to handle, and the cooking times will definitely be longer. You might also discover that the amount of smoke you are generating is not enough for all of it. Take the time to learn what the limits of your cooker are.

One of my favorite Clint Eastwood lines comes at the end of the film Magnum Force, part of the Dirty Harry series: "A man's got to know his limitations." Churches cannot be all things to all people. When we try to do so, we are falling into the consumer mindset trap. We may attract some people who are drawn to graze in our pasture. But when they've eaten it up, they move onto



the next place searching for more. This also ties into point number 2. As we experiment, try one thing at a time. We need to stretch beyond our natural comfort zones but it needs to happen at a manageable rate. That is not an excuse to do nothing. But before expecting a leader, or a pastor, to do what is the work of the congregation, everyone is set up for failure. The work of

the church is not done properly and there is not enough smoke generated. Hope you stayed with me through that analogy.

Here are some examples of important symbols you may have in your life that carry important meaning:

- a wedding ring
- refrigerator art from when your teenager was a child
- a family heirloom that was passed down to you
- a moment in time that was captured in a photograph
- an item from your childhood home that takes you back in time when you look at it

Symbols are powerful. I would like to suggest that you harness the power of symbols to help pass down faith to your teenager.

This month's article is my way to encourage you as a parent. Your job is so important, and our student ministry is cheering you on as you pass down faith to your teenager.

I challenge you to consider how you can use symbols as a tool to help you pass down faith to your teenager.

The reason I believe this is an appropriate method is because God used it.

- In Genesis 9:13-17 God used a rainbow as a symbol of His promise
- In Genesis 28:18-22 Jacob established a monument to remind himself of God's promise to bless his descendants
- In Genesis 7:8-13 Aaron's staff became a symbol to Pharaoh of God's presence with the Israelites and His power
- In Exodus 12 the Passover feast is rich with symbolism none more important than the use of the Lamb to represent coming salvation

and it goes on and on....

- the monument of 12 stones when the tribes of Israel crossed the Jordan river
- the 10 commandments given on stone tablets
- the ark of the covenant
- the Temple

on and on...

It's not just in the Old Testament either. In the New Testament we see symbols:

- the gifts of the Magi to Jesus in Luke 2
- Jesus washing His disciples' feet in John 13
- the use of symbols in the many Parables that Jesus taught
- the expensive perfume spilled on Jesus' feet in Matthew 26

and on and on...

- the breaking of bread representing the breaking of Jesus' body
- the wine that represented His blood
- the cross which is perhaps the greatest symbol in all of Christendom

God used symbols in the Scripture. Still to this day those symbols remind us of who God is and what He has promised.

As a parent who is passing down faith you have a great opportunity to offer symbols to your teenager as well.

The Rites of Passage Experience that our student ministry is offering to your family is a great place to start discovering symbols you can offer your teenager. I encourage you to take some time to pray, dream, and think about the types of powerful symbols you can present to your teenager. It can help them remember the faith that your family holds dear.
