Sermon Notes

The Gospel and Postmodernism Acts 10:34–43; 1 Corinthians 1:26–2:5

- 1. Postmodernism brings a number of positive things to the table. Like the Christian gospel, it urges us to listen to voices of outsiders, and to take seriously the stories of peoples long silenced. It urges us to be sensitive to power issues and the ______ of assumed cultural superiority.
- 2. However, on the other hand, there is much in postmodernism that is clearly antithetical to the Christian faith. It is characteristic of postmodernism to assert that there are no universal truths, no absolute values, no inherent meaning in texts that we read, and no over-arching stories that make sense of the world, called meta-narratives. Christianity claims that the God who is revealed in Jesus Christ provides all of ______, and more.
- 3. Jim Edwards reminds us that "The early church proclaimed the gospel of Jesus Christ not from a position of power, nor in support of a position of power. The gospel was first proclaimed by a tiny minority no more than two or three thousand at first on the eastern fringe of the Roman Empire. Its earliest symbols were loaves and fish, a vine and grapes, a lamb, a dove, an olive branch, a boat and an anchor, a basin and towel, a veiled woman praying with raised hands, the Good Shepherd. These were not symbols of ______ and dominance, but of deliverance, security, kinship, healing and service...."
- 4. "In many and various ways the Bible clearly recounts the architectural design of salvation from Abraham to Christ. Jesus was aware of the grand narrative and of his particular role in it.... [The Bible's remarkable testimony] attests to [Jesus'] anchor role in the ______ relay race, as the following verse testifies. [Jesus said,] 'Blessed are the eyes that see what you see! For I tell you that many prophets and kings desired to see what you see, but did not see it, and to hear what you hear, but did not hear it.' (Luke 10:23-24)." [Jim Edwards]
- 5. You see, one of the main pieces for understanding the truth of the gospel and the truth that Jesus is the only Savior of the world is that by the power of God and the power of his Spirit, people's lives are changed. They will never be the same again. But that is literally what happens when we grasp God's deep love for us, and that Jesus died not only for the sins of the whole world, but for ______ sin as well.
- 6. Peter thus gives the grand narrative, starting with the prophets of the Old Testament and concluding with the good news that because Jesus is our Savior and the ______ Savior, when we believe in him we receive forgiveness for our sins through his name.
