#### **Comments for Contemplation**

Rejoicing that Christ is Proclaimed Numbers 11:16–17, 24–29; Philippians 1:12–18c 1. Professor Donald Lutz has counted in all the writings of the founders 3,154 citations of other works; of these, nearly 1,100 or 34% are references to the Bible, about three and a half times more than the next closest number of citations of a source. Of the 56 of the Declaration of Independence, 34 were Anglican, 13 Congregationalist, 6 Presbyterian, and one each for Baptist, Catholic, and Quaker. 2. Gradually, however, as he watched the misbegotten actions of King George III in the colonies, and his wrong and destructive misjudgments, he [Witherspoon] was drawn to the cause of Independence. Witherspoon taught his students to examine the deep connection between civil and religious liberty. He wanted them to know that all rights spring from free decisions made by individuals in the presence of the Creator of the \_\_\_\_\_. No university president or clergyman has played so great a role in shaping this nation's character than John Witherspoon. 3. The momentum of what we might call moral entropy is only hastened by a lack of committed faith and moral seriousness, even in the church, from which only a spiritual awakening has been known to offer a cure. I would suggest that we are approaching such a time, when the moral entropy of our country is \_\_\_\_\_to faith is endemic, even in the church. accelerating, and when a laziness and 4. But the word was getting out that Paul was imprisoned simply for his faith in Christ, which created a certain compassion and interest among those who had heard, both soldiers and civilians who were involved in the prison system. And they were beginning to consider the claims of Jesus Christ that Paul had shared with them. —A chance to learn about gifts, equipping, ministry and mission.


## Rev. Dr. Larry Thomas - The Early Church
