# The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this. Treat Them Gently - Good Advice from a friend of Pastor Rich

My friend, Pastor Glenn McDonald from Indianapolis, has experienced people who don't agree with him. He has some good advice for people who have difficulty getting along with others. As we begin Advent, it is worth hearing his advice:

Shortly after I entered seminary, Mary Sue and I hoped that we might be able to make some friends.

We invited two other seminary couples to our apartment for dinner on a Friday evening.

After we had cleared the plates we got out a deck of cards and said, "So, who'd like to play some Hearts?"

We will never forget the looks of shock and horror that came over the faces of our guests.

They had all been raised in church traditions that equated card-playing with deep sin.

I don't think we could have offended our guests more gravely than if we had said, "You know, there are so many good dog casserole recipes. How did you like that labradoodle you ate this evening?"

Ongoing battles about non-essential issues (like dancing, card-playing, and choosing the "right" translation of the Bible) have long tarnished the Church's reputation before the watching world.

Even as outsiders strain to catch a glimpse of this transforming life that Christfollowers keep advertising, what they often hear instead is haggling about questions that truly don't seem to matter.

How much water does it take to be properly baptized? Is it OK to drink a beer while watching your favorite team? Is it acceptable for worship leaders to wear jeans? Will God be upset if I get a tattoo?

What are people of faith supposed to do if it appears that Scripture hasn't specifically addressed these and countless other issues?

The apostle Paul declares that when there's a Winners vs. Losers mentality regarding peripheral spiritual issues, even those who think they are "winning" wind up losers.

Here's what he advises: "Welcome with open arms fellow believers who don't see things the way you do. And don't jump all over them every time they do or say something you don't agree with — even when it seems that they are strong on opinions but weak in the faith department. Remember, they have their own history to deal with. Treat them gently." (Romans 14:1-3, The Message)

Accepting others means we can lay down the terrible burden of trying to be right about every peripheral issue.

And that means we don't have to invest massive amounts of time and energy trying to convert others to our way of seeing things.

Which just might leave enough time for us to get to know each other over a few hands of Bridge.

Amen and amen.

# "An Unexpected Messenger"

Can you imagine people scalping tickets to a Sunday worship service at FPCA for \$500? Neither can I and I'm very thankful for that. But that is what happened when Kanye West appeared at Joel Osteen's church in Houston. Much has been made about Kanye's recent Christian album and what can only be called a revival in Louisiana. It has many people wondering what this is all about. Some cynics see this as a money grab as some report he had accumulated an immense amount of debt. The truth is that Kanye has always been pretty unpredictable and you never quite know what he is going to say next.

Kanye's appearance at Osteen's church was broadcast online. Tickets could be claimed online for free but of course people found a way to capitalize on the unique event as the demand for tickets skyrocketed. It has been interesting to hear several conversations about all this spring up at church and even in conversations with fellow pastors. While we cannot truly judge what is Kanye's heart, there are some truths that are evident that we can draw from.

First, Kanye does not treat these events as concerts or shows. He views them as mission. Before sitting down with Osteen, Kanye and his choir visited a prison in Houston to perform privately for inmates. I have not heard of an upcoming "Kanye at Folsom Prison" album or film being released anytime soon. But I must say, that would be intriguing!

Second, at his revival in Louisiana, Kanye made every effort to not make the event about him. This megastar did everything he could to avoid the spotlight and personal attention. It is easy for pastors and worship leaders to make moments about ourselves and not actual worship. This was an impressive and humble gesture on his part.

Third, listening to the young men and women who attended saying how they had never heard the gospel before speaks to God's fingerprint on all of our lives. There is something innate in us that longs to connect with our Creator. Our souls long for God. And sometimes the means of making that connection can come from a very unexpected voice.

Kanye was and is a voice out in the wilderness pointing not to himself, but Christ. I'm not saying he's John the Baptist. When we see him in camel's hair and eating wild locusts and honey, then we can say that. But until that happens, it definitely is John the Baptist-ish!

Ultimately, what is most important, is that Christ is glorified throughout all this. Paul writes in Philippians 1:15-18, "Some proclaim Christ from envy and rivalry, but others from goodwill. These proclaim Christ out of love, knowing that I have been put here for the defense of the gospel; the others proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely but intending to increase my suffering in my imprisonment. What does it matter? Just this, that Christ is proclaimed in every way, whether out of false motives or true; and in that I rejoice."

Kanye is not the first mega-successful artist to be born-again. He joins the ranks of Bob Dylan, Alice Cooper, and even John Lennon who had a conversion late in life. While we cannot predict what he will say next, we should rejoice in how he is connecting lost souls with their Creator. And hopefully we can be inspired to be the ones crying out in our own wildernesses, pointing others to Christ the Lord. Merry Christmas!
