# SEEING THE FUTURE

No one can really see the future. And for that matter, technically, we can't see the present either. I have read that every second our eyes are open, they receive and send about 100 billion signals down our optic nerve to our cerebral cortex. Our brains process these signals and prepare appropriate responses. But there is some lag time in this amazing process. It takes about a fifth of a second for a visual input to be received and processed. That means that there is a bit of time between what is happening right now and our awareness of it. Pastor Glenn McDonald has written about this.

A fifth of a second doesn't seem very long. But what if you have to avoid a fist coming toward your face, or dodge a falling rock, or extend your arms at the exact right time to catch a pass that wins the Super Bowl? The very smallest slice of time would seem to matter then, a great deal.

Yet we human beings have an amazing way of solving this problem. It involves the most incredible organ in our bodies: our brain. Glenn writes: "During the time it takes you to read this reflection, that three-pound gray, spongy mass inside your cranium will have processed more information than the Hubble Space Telescope has processed since it went into orbit in 1990. According to Dr. Magnus Bordewich of Durham University, your brain holds an estimated 200 exabytes of information, roughly equal to 'the entire digital content of today's world."

"You have one impressive brain, especially considering the fact that 80% of it is just plain old water. So, how does your brain deal with the time lag between "actual reality" and what you see? It makes stuff up. Specifically, your brain fills the gap by generating a likely forecast of the future. That's the picture that is presented to your eyes. At any given moment you're seeing what your brain thinks the world will look like a fifth of a second from now." McDonald explains that this means we never see the world as it really is. As author Bill Bryson puts it, "We spend our whole lives...living in a world that doesn't quite exist yet."

There are other ways of seeing the future, however, Glenn says. We are not talking about the Wall Street whizzes who are sure they know the ups and downs of the market, or the political pundits who think they know what is happening in our nation's capital.

God declares the future as if it is happening now, and that is because God, in a way we cannot comprehend, exists in the past, present and future at the same time. 'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.' (Jeremiah 29:11). This is not a divine "maybe." God's plans for the future are a certainty - an assurance that cannot be overturned, a promise that cannot be taken back.

In the midst of whatever uncertainties happen to be clouding your life right now - a difficult financial bind, a hurtful relative, that dreaded phone call from your doctor - you can see the future by fixing your gaze on God, the One who knows the plans he has for you. God knows his plans for FPCA, and we are seeking his counsel for discerning those. That future may not exist quite yet. But in the future, it will. Which means that today we are to answer God's call to take one step at a time with the 20/20 vision of faith.

## Why Students Serve

Parent Cue

Do you ever wonder what kids really think about serving? I'd recommend *Deep Justice in a Broken World: Helping your Kids Serve Others and Right the Wrongs Around Them* by Chap Clark and Kara Powell. They mention a 2006 nationwide survey conducted by MTV to hear from students directly on why they help others.

\*70% think it's important to help others in need, but only 19% were "very involved."

To unpack this further, the survey ranked the top five reasons youth aren't involved.

- 1. It's just not for me (18%)
- 2. I like to hang out with friends (15%)
- 3. I don't have enough time (14%)
- 4. I don't know how to get started (14%)
- 5. I want to see concrete results (8%)

\*70% of kids already involved helping others say that their parent's encouragement played a major role in why they serve. (As parents we need to remember this one stat and understand our potential to engage our children in a bigger story.)

Two other important factors that would motivate more youth to get involved:

- If they could do the activity with their friends.
- If they had more time to volunteer or more convenient volunteer activities.
