Jars of Clay, Grateful to the Lord

2019 has been a significant year of hard work for the Lord's kingdom, and a year of hard looks at our capacities and needs as a church body with an aging church building. This past year was one of preparing to repair our roofs, which has now finally started. It was a year of hiring architects, planners and consultants, all of whom proved to be quite capable and helpful to us as we prepare for upgrading our entire building. It was a year of saying "may God bless you," to our gifted Church Office Administrator, Gary Lindley, a retired Methodist pastor, who needed to step down because of health issues. We now rejoice in welcoming a new Facilities Manager (different title) who will replace Gary, a young man named Mannie Owings, who is already doing a great job.

Since we are jars of clay, we are leaky vessels like our old roofs. We live and move and have our being in the Lord our God, to whom we are eternally grateful. We have many excellent signs from the Lord to look at in terms of our church's health, but we also slipped in some key areas. We are working and praying that God would reverse the areas where we slipped, and continue to prosper the areas where we shine.

Preaching and Worship

Chris and I preached through some important themes, challenging and teaching our congregation to live out our mission to "transform life by glorifying God, following Jesus, and loving our neighbor." We concluded the adventure of learning about God's story in the Scriptures, using a curriculum called, *The Story*, which covered the entire Bible in a nine month span. From January 13 to May 19, we covered King Solomon all the way to concluding with Revelation. Then for six weeks, we looked at "Is Jesus the Only Savior?" based on the book by Dr. James R. Edwards. We then took eight weeks to preach on a "Journey Into Joy - Paul's Letter to the Philippians." In September, we looked at the theme of "Connections-God's Story and

Our Story: Revealed, Saved, Transformed, Sent." We then began an amazing theme for our fall Generosity Campaign called "Will You Grow?" Some seventy percent of those turning in generosity commitments agreed to grow in their financial commitment to the Lord's work at First Presbyterian. We concluded the year with The Characters of Christmas and our wonderful Advent Festival of Music was worshipful and very well attended, as was Christmas Eve.

Changing Lives

We began, in worship last September, sharing stories of how your generous support of this ministry changes lives and brings people to Jesus with compassion and service. We have tried to share stories of children, youth, staff, missionaries, and others who experienced God's love and grace through the work of our church here at FPCA. Many people have responded positively to hearing these moving and inspirational stories of God at work because of you.

Having said this, as a part of Christ's Body, we still need to grow in our missional discipleship, reaching out to new folks and inviting them into this adventure with the Lord. Only this will begin to reverse the trends in mainline Protestant churches. Unfortunately, we saw our worship attendance decline somewhat this year, and with it, we had a modest decrease in total giving. That was offset by the amazing commitment made in our fall "Will You Grow?" Generosity Campaign, which increased our commitments to our 2020 annual budget amount by \$130,469, or 19%! Praise God! And thanks to all of you!

The Biggest Challenge

We now face the biggest challenge that we have faced in the last five years. The Lord has placed before us the opportunity to grow in our faith and become the inviting church that we desire to be! You will be hearing more about our Capital Campaign, and you will have the opportunity to make a three-year financial commitment, over and above your regular budget giving, to upgrade our building and turn it into a facility that communicates our love for the Lord and for our community. It will enable us to serve our seniors with mobility issues, our families with small children, and anyone who wants to connect with the Lord here at FPCA. Pray with us for this time in our church's life!

May the Lord continue to use these "jars of clay" to extend his love and to further his kingdom!

2019 Annual Report – Rev. Chris Campbell, Associate Pastor

2019 proved to be an exciting yet challenging year for FPCA. I first want to say thank you to all of our teachers, volunteers, and staff who plan, lead, facilitate, support, and step in as backup. Your faithful dedication to the nurture of all disciples – beginning in the nursery throughout all of our adult classes – does *not* go unnoticed. But we do not recognize and thank you enough. From the discipleship angle, our study of *The Story* was incredibly fruitful. Nearly all of our adult classes journeyed through the Sunday school program in conjunction with the preaching series during worship. Also, we officially concluded our work with the Missional Community Training Kit led by missional pioneer Alex Absalom. Alex provided monthly coaching in addition to the online resources. I continue to hear exciting stories of how members are utilizing these principles in their workplaces and neighborhoods.

This was also an important year in further identifying needed improvements with our facility in order to live out our mission statement more effectively. I will not use this space to list again those needs. They will be thoroughly explained in other places in this annual report as well as our 2020 capital campaign. I will reiterate though what an amazing job Kyle and Adrian do in spite of the barriers of our facility. That gratitude extends to our adult teachers as well because the building does not make it easy for anyone to easily know where to ao. First-time quests might choose to fight through those challenges one time, if at all. Most likely it is a major deterrent in becoming a second-time guest. As pastor at United Presbyterian Church in Greenville, TX, we faced many of the same challenges. That building was built in the same era as this one which served that time and place perfectly. However, it just was not configured for ministry in the 21st century. I have been excited to bring that experience with me here and I feel it is being well utilized in these efforts.

Thank you all for your support and commitment to FPCA's success. Ministry truly is a team sport and each of you plays a vital role.

A committee is currently interviewing candidates for this position. While the position remains open, Russell Farnell continues to carry out many of the responsibilities.

Trustees

The Trustees receive, hold, encumber, manage, and transfer property, including restricted and unrestricted funds, following approval of the Congregation, and subject to the authority of Session.

This year, Trustees Charles Arnold, Lisa House, and Michael Fielder reviewed quarterly performance of the long-term investments entrusted to Texas Presbyterian Foundation (TPF). Trustees reviewed asset allocation to assure that invested funds were in line with FPCA investment policy and reported performance to Session. During the first quarter of 2019, a total of \$13,791 representing a 5% Session-approved 2018 distribution was transferred to funds available for use by FPCA. Based on TPF investment performance through the third quarter of 2019, Trustees recommended, and Session approved, a 5% (maximum allowable) distribution for the year 2020, to be accomplished in the first quarter of 2020, based on fund balances as of December 31, 2019. TPF investments reflect the following change in Long Term Investments for the year 2019:

\$346,866 December 31, 2018 \$383,232 December 31, 2019

Fixed Assets totaled \$4,613,368 as of December 31, 2018, and \$4,615,348 as of December 31, 2019.

Trustees also reviewed and executed contracts and legal documents on behalf of FPCA. In FY 2019, such documents included contracts for property insurance, consulting services for FPCA's capital campaign and operating budget campaign, and loan documents with Presbyterian Investment and Loan for long-needed roof repairs needed to restore FPCA infrastructure.

Finance

- The operating budget for 2019 was \$1,085,380.
- The 2019 operating budget was a balanced budget based on pledges and historical giving estimates, along with the use of Temporarily Restricted Funds either on hand or raised during the year. The budget plan included the expectation of total revenue contributions of \$985,018, and restricted funds use of \$100,362.
- As shown in the Financial Reports included with this report, the total revenue contributed in 2019 was \$943,711 and the total amount of restricted funds used for the Operating Budget was \$99,935. Total expenses for the 2019 Operating Budget were \$1,039,305. Total non-annual expenses were \$138,337. Total restricted funds used for the Non-Annual expenses were \$136,096.
- The operating budget for 2020 is a balanced budget of \$1,119,844. Expected revenue contributions and reimbursements is \$1,040,910, and expected use of Session and restricted funds is \$78,934.
- Because of severe hail and water damage to part of the church roof, the church applied for a loan from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Investment & Loan Program in 2018. The use of a loan to expedite the roof repair was approved by the members of the church at a special congregational meeting held November 18, 2018. That loan amount was \$305,000 at 3.5% for 15 years. No draw was made on this loan during 2019. When bids were received for the repair work, the costs exceeded the original estimates by a considerable amount. The congregation voted to approve raising the PILP an additional \$195,000 to a total of \$500,000, on December 1, 2019. Payments do not begin until money is drawn and then are interest only until the project is completed.

Administration Team

Online and Social Media Ministry - 2019

What an exciting year 2019 was to the Social Media Ministry. We had such an amazing year and the Lord was able to touch many lives through this ministry:

- Over 44,000 people in our local community were reached with several different campaigns on Facebook: Prayer Requests Campaign, VBS, Kids Night Out, Holy Week and Easter Sunday, and the Spring Festival. Those are advertising campaigns that ran on Facebook through the church's Facebook page, were aimed at our community, and were meant to bring awareness to our key events, build an online presence, and build a ministry.
- By the time that I write this, the ministry now has 710 people (more than double since last year) with whom I communicate at least once a week, offering prayers, sending devotional messages, providing spiritual support, and inviting them to our activities, events, Bible studies, and Sunday services. Some examples are people suffering from depression, anxiety, cancer and other illnesses, unemployment, financial struggles, unstructured families, addictions, and other big problems.
- From those 710, our church has received a few visitors. I should highlight that they are non-members in need of prayers and spiritual support. Most importantly, through the Social Media Ministry, and through our prayers and spiritual support, our church has received a new member that has professed her faith.
- 13,718 minutes of sermons, recordings, and video content were viewed on our Facebook page.
- We now have 143 new Facebook page followers from 2019. The great majority of these are non-members, people from our community that like our content and are inclined to engage online and by visiting us.

I truly believe that our local community is in need of prayers and spiritual support. The focus of this ministry is to transform lives through Jesus Christ, and help those who are in need of his support. Our Lord has said, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick; I have come to call not the righteous but sinners." (Mark 2:17). This is the heart of this ministry. This is the heart of our church's mission.

With your faithful support much more is still to come. The harvest is plentiful.

Discipleship Team

Children's Ministry

We had a great year of children's ministry in 2019. We had Sunday School and KFC weekly on Sunday mornings going thru the Bible with the rest of the church using *The Story*. After completing *The Story* we resumed using curriculum by Orange.

In Sunday School we have three main objectives for teaching preschoolers:

- 1. God made me.
- 2. God loves me.
- 3. Jesus wants to be my friend forever.

The three main objectives for KFC and elementary Sunday School are:

- 1. I can trust God no matter what.
- 2. I need to make the wise choice (this requires obeying parents and looking to the Bible).
- 3. I should treat others the way I want to be treated.

We also gave Bibles to children in kindergarten and older who had not received one from the church. We had Kids Night Out about twice a month during the school year. Kids Night Out takes place on Friday nights and is a fun time for children to play, eat, build friendships, introduce friends to church and learn about God. We get kids who regularly attend FPCA on Sundays and some of their friends, children from the neighborhood and Kids Beach Club kids for Kids Night Out.

We also had Kids Beach Club at Blanton Elementary in 2019. We meet a little over 20 times with elementary students during the school year for Kids Beach Club. At each Kids Beach Club we teach about character using the Bible. We have a memory verse, snack, Bible lesson, character word for the day and games. We also give children's study Bibles to the Kids Beach Club kids.

The Spring Festival and Trunk or Treat were amazing. We had the Spring Festival with a petting zoo and egg hunt about a week before Easter. The Mission and Evangelism Team did a great job with Trunk or Treat and the children's ministry enjoyed helping. At both the Spring Festival and Trunk or Treat we had great volunteers from FPCA, children who regularly attend FPCA and a lot of children from the community.

Vacation Bible School was June 10-14 and we had a great time learning to Power Up by looking to God and following Him. While all of these things were great, the best is seeing kids believe Jesus and follow Him. We see this in kids memorizing verses, applying Bible lessons to their lives, inviting friends, awards they get in school for their behavior and comments from teachers.

We praise God for a great 2019 in children's ministry and we say thank you to all the parents, volunteers and people who helped support FPCA and the children's ministry in any way.

New To Our Youth Ministry

Each year we seek the Lord for new ways that we can serve our youth and community. This year we had the privilege to start some new amazing ministry opportunities. Here were just a few of the new ministry opportunities we were able to be a part of:

Love Invasion

Love Invasion is a spring break "staycation" mission trip and Kingdom partnership between Bethesda, City on a Hill, First Presbyterian Church Arlington, Grace Covenant, Grace Lutheran, Mosaic, Oasis, and Park Row Christian. Through Love Invasion we were able to serve our community through mission work and help teach our youth the importance of serving.

WyldLife

WyldLife is an outreach ministry that comes out of Young Life where the focus is our middle school kids from Carter Jr. High. WyldLife gave me and other volunteer leaders an opportunity to meet with Carter Jr. students twice a month and share the Gospel. We **averaged 60 students** every time we gathered.

Summer Internship Program

This year we were able to bring on a youth intern to help with all of our summer initiatives. This first year we were able to bring on Caroline Vanderberg, one of our very own college students and former youth to help lead our youth ministry during the summer. Caroline did an amazing job and it also helped her grow in her faith. Here is little of what she had to say about her experience:

- "I learned so much about loving kids unconditionally and how to be a leader when things are tough."
- "The people I worked with were positive and genuine."
- "I learned how to be patient, how to handle stressful situations, and how to completely rely on the Lord."

There {4} Teen Gathering Conference

There {4} is a girls' youth conference that is inspiring the next generation of girls to boldly live out their identity in Christ. Several of our youth girls attended this conference and they loved it. They can't wait to attend again in 2020.

Continued Ministry Opportunities

Summer camps/conferences continue to be an integral part of our youth ministry. This year we took **28 junior high school youth and leaders** (majority of students from Carter Jr. High) to **The Great Escape** trip in Colorado. Our trip saw a total of **6 students** accept Christ as their Lord and Savior.

Computer Donation Program, Year Four

Through the leadership of Mr. Allen Ray & Mrs. Carole Ray and Dick Thomas from Heart of Arlington Neighborhood Association (HANA), we were able to continue our computer donation program. The objective of this program is to give students who wouldn't otherwise have access to a computer an opportunity to complete school assignments, course work when they move on to high school, and beyond. This year we awarded **four students** with laptops.

2019 was by far an amazing year for our youth ministry and we look forward to all the great things God will do in 2020!

Men's Ministry

Men's ministry had a budget of \$690 for this year. None of this money was used. We continue with weekly Bible studies on Wednesday morning. We also continue to promote the yearly men's retreat at Mo-Ranch, but we no longer offer financial support of that activity.

Women's Ministry

The last weekend in March, Ginger Hertenstein presented "Diving Deeper" at the annual Women's Retreat. Held at the Hilton Garden Inn in Granbury, the focus of the retreat was on revealing deeper Biblical truths and finding greater applicability to our own lives through concentrated reading. In the fall, the Women's Ministry Team worked together to set team goals for 2020 and beyond. One of those goals is to serve Christ by leading women to a closer relationship with Him. To that end, the team planned an in house gathering, early in the new year, to help women develop the discipline of daily quiet time with the Lord.

Adult Ministry

There were 10 different adult Sunday school classes/Bible studies to choose from in 2019.

Theological Inquiries Class

In January-May 2019, the class concluded the study of *The Story*, an abridged version of the Bible. The class then resumed and concluded its study of *As Kingfishers Catch Fire: A Conversation On The Ways Of God By The Words Of God* by Reverend Eugene Peterson. Rev. Peterson's book is a collection of 49 of his sermons spanning the Old and New Testaments. A study of a second book by Rev. Peterson, *Under the Unpredictable Plant: An Exploration in Vocational Holiness* was completed as the year drew to a close. Other activities: 1) the Indagate and Theological Inquiries classes hosted a five week lecture by the Rev. Dr. Larry Thomas titled "*The Early Church: From Acts to the Nicene Creed*" and 2) the class served dinner to the clients of the Arlington Life Shelter.

Theological Inquiries will begin 2020 with a series of lectures. The first one will be led by the Rev. Dr. Larry Thomas titled "*Christian Theology in the 20th and Early 21st Centuries."* At the end of the lectures, the class will dissolve after 30 plus years. The class is grateful for Rev. Thomas, who founded Theological Inquiries, and for

the wonderful friendships and memories experienced through the years in exploring God's word and work in the world.

Family Living Class

The Family Living Class completed its 9-month study of *The Story* in May, returning to our study of *The Present Word* scripture-centric curriculum in June, led by a rotation of teachers within the class: Sam Polk, Dick Price, Helen Moulton, Jim C Quick, J Fred Miller, and Ross Dill. The pedagogical format is teacher led discussion and exchange. Refreshments are available most Sundays in the adjoining kitchen, provided by volunteers within the class who sign up on a monthly basis. Sandy Tomlinson keeps the class organized and wired, adding new members to the class roster and sending out a monthly Family Living Class schedule of events, birthdays, and anniversaries. Members of the class serve as Elders, Deacons, and Trustees for the church, as called to do so, and some members are active in Women's and Men's Bible Studies at the church. The class' mission and discipleship opportunities continue to be the Life Shelter, H.O.P.E. Tutoring, Kids Beach Club, New Day Backpacks, and now partnership in the church's Christmas decorations. Class members pray for each other, for the church, for community leaders at all levels, and celebrate joys within the class.

Loose Ends Class

The Loose Ends Class began the year with the churchwide study of *The Story*. After completing that, we went on to study Hebrews and the letters of John. In addition, the class enjoyed providing dinner at the Life Shelter in June and participating in food distribution at the Mobile Food Pantry in October. Loose Enders also gathered for a picnic outing. Mainly, we enjoyed delving deeper into the Bible and just being together.

Friendship Class

The Friendship Class of about 25-30 members studied the uniform session series *The Present Word* led by a rotation of teachers within the class: Richard Ankele, Sue Lavender, Liz Lowrance, and Carol Moody. In addition to Bible study, the class provided and served a meal for the clients of Arlington Life Shelter, provided and served a breakfast for the staff and teachers of Carter Junior High School, provided 7 Thanksgiving baskets for Arlington Charities, sponsored a youth for FPCA Summer camp and 5 youths for ALS Spring Break program, bought the freezer for the large kitchen at FPCA, and helped with Trunk or Treat. We support each other with prayer and fellowship and welcome visitors to our class anytime throughout the year.

Genesis Class

Genesis is a welcoming class of baby boomers (or whatever age - we're easy) in room 208. We enjoy class activities like serving at the Life Shelter, Thanksgiving baskets, movie night, Levitt Pavilion, and others. Class lessons are from small group studies and various Bible studies, which invite discussion as the group works to strengthen members' faith. In addition to enjoying the church-wide studies this past year, the Genesis Class studied:

Bible Study Class

The Bible Study Sunday School class studies through one book of the Bible at a time meeting weekly to discuss one chapter per week. We are a loving group of Christians that meet to jointly study God's word and support one another through prayer and fellowship. During 2019, our class participated in the church-wide study of *The Story* through May. Next, we continued our study of the Bible with the books of Daniel, Nahum, Jonah, and Amos. Attendance fluctuates a bit as we welcome drop-ins and those who are available for limited periods of time. We open each class by sharing our joys and concerns so that we may pray for one another. Prayer is followed by time in the Word as we share the insights we've gained through our study of Scripture during the week.

In addition to Bible study on Sunday morning, the class meets for fellowship and service opportunities. In November, the class met for a pot-luck dinner and evening to hear about our fellow class member's (George Neill) mission trips to Africa. We also volunteered as a class to serve at the Mobile Food Pantry and coordinated the Teacher Appreciation breakfast for teachers at Carter Jr. High in May. You are invited to join us! Foundations Class

The Foundations Sunday school class studied a variety of studies throughout the year. Class members took turns leading discussions along with Rev. Campbell and Bob Watkins who served as a guest teacher, which everyone loved.

The class also had several social events - a Super Bowl party at the Fielder's home; a pool party at the Annen's house; a Cowboys watching party at the Pena's house.

Indagators Class

The class began the year with a new course of interactive study presented by Dr. Molly Worthen on "The History of Christianity from the Reformation to the Modern Megachurch", which explored the complex journey of the Christian faith forward from the turn of the 16th century to becoming a global religion of the present day. Dr. Worthen received her PhD in Religious Studies from Yale and is currently an assistant professor at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. Her course is offered through "The Great Courses."

During the summer, the Indagators and the Theological Inquiry Class co-hosted a 5 week lecture series by Rev. Dr. Larry Thomas on the "Origins and Growth of the Christian Tradition: The Early Church from Acts to Nicaea." Other activities of the class included serving dinner at the Arlington Life Shelter and continued support of the Arlington Charities through our gifts.

Currently, we are co-hosting with the Theological Inquiry Class a 4-week lecture series by Rev. Dr. Larry Thomas on "Christian Theology in the 20th and Early 21st Centuries." The series will run through February 2nd and is presented during the Sunday School hour in the Fellowship Hall. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Men's Bible Study

The Wednesday Men's Bible Study is the FPCA's longest continuous Bible study having been in existence for 20 plus years. During January-July 2019, the group concluded a study of **The Gospel of Luke** and **The Acts Of The Apostles.** In August and September the men studied the Apostle Paul's **Epistle to the Philippians** in parallel with the pastors' sermon series. The group are currently studying **The Gospel according to John** which will carry into 2020. All Bible studies conducted during 2019 have utilized commentaries by N.T. ("Tom") Wright, an episcopal bishop. The Men's Bible Study again provided financial support toward the youth's summer camps.

Women's Bible Study

The Monday Night Women's Bible Study began their 19th year together in September. The 2019-2020 study is the Horizon's Study. We saw some of our long-time members have to discontinue Bible Study this year, but were happy to welcome several new members. As always, this group is open to all women and they can join at any time.

Light meals were prepared by members at each meeting. Rev. Betsy Pense has continued to facilitate 3-4 lessons per year. The other meetings are taught by members of the group. A special thanks to

those who volunteer to lead: Sheri Quick, Helen Moulton, Kathy Moore, Judy Northup, Isobel Peden.

Women's Bible Study meets the third Monday of each month, except December, June, July and August, and meets at 6 p.m. in the church parlor.

The group continued their outreach with supplying children's books at the Trunk or Treat. For the 2018 event, over 200 books were given away. Next years goal for the group is to have at least 300 books available.

Debbie Richardson and Sheri Quick are the group coordinators.

Small Group Ministry

The Small Group Ministry includes Saints Alive, Porchlights/ Streetlights, Happy Quilters, and library volunteers. These adults continue their growth in discipleship as they have fellowship and pray together.

The library committee meets on the first Wednesday of the month to catalogue books and get them on the shelves. New books arrive almost every week, as donations or purchased for a specific need. The computer in the library has a catalog of all the books and the list can be browsed by author or title or searched for a particular book. In addition to cataloguing the books, the committee keeps the library tidy and re-shelves returned books. Several book reports appeared on the church website and in *The News*, highlighting a book recently added to the library.

- Due to the retirement of our long-term landscaper, the Team entered into a contract with Prime Landscape, an Arlington business, to not only do the lawn mowing, but also trim the hedges and clean up the leaves.
- On a Saturday work party, the women's bathroom in the narthex was painted and cleaned up.
- In a project that took just over a week with many volunteers the old brown hall was painted white. Lew Johnson and Christine Apperson spent a lot of time working and coordinating the project.
- The ice machine in the kitchen was replaced.
- Lew Johnson and Bob Dawson resurfaced all of the front exterior doors.

A very special thanks and appreciation to Larry Stephenson who has been working closely over this past year dealing with the roof insurance claim and assisting in the search, evaluation and selection of a roofing contractor who started work replacing the roof the end of December 2019.

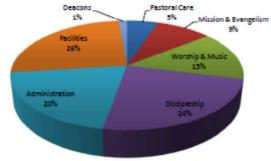

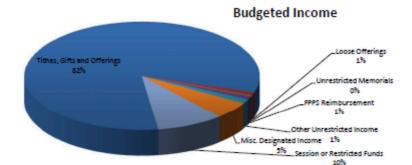

food pantry, and we saw a marked increase in the number of people served through this mission. It is a wonderful outreach and an easy way for members to get "hands on" in ministry. We plan to support again in 2020. Please consider getting directly involved by gathering a group of friends to volunteer for a month in 2020. We send at least 5 people from FPCA each month to serve.

Backpack Meals – FPCA works with New Day – a non-profit agency run by volunteers that provides weekend food to food insufficient AISD students. During the school year, several of FPCA's adult Sunday School classes provide monetary assistance to this program. Approximately 50 kids at Blandon Elementary receive sacks of food that members of the Family Living Class fill when they meet on Thursday afternoons at Westminster Presbyterian Church. Students carry the backpacks home to enable kids to have food over the weekend.

Arlington Life Shelter (ALS) - FPCA continues to assist the ALS with various needs annually, including funding. Six FPCA Sunday School classes (Genesis Class, Indagators, Loose Ends, Family Living, Friendship, and Theological Inquiries) also volunteer to prepare and serve an evening meal every other month to Arlington Life Shelter clients. The Arlington Life Shelter is growing and expanding. They are renovating their existing shelter and building a new, two-story, 12,642 sq. ft. facility adjacent to the current shelter. The updated and new facilities will open in June 2020. With these updates, the Arlington Life Shelter will be able to serve more people and offer additional services to the local community. FPCA along with many local churches is proud to support and serve the ALS.

Arlington Charities – FPCA continues to assist Arlington Charities with various needs annually, including funding and food donations. Arlington Charities is also a partner in the Mobile Food Bank, Thanksgiving Baskets, and Mitten Tree activities.

Thanksgiving Food Baskets - Members of FPCA continue to generously support this event. This year 215 food baskets were delivered to Arlington Charities for distribution to families in need. The food baskets contain everything required to prepare a Thanksgiving meal with cash for the turkey. In 2019, FPCA donated 2,912 pounds of food and \$3,158.00 to support the Thanksgiving Food Baskets.

Trunk or Treat - M&E helped with this annual event on Saturday, October 26th. The event was held outside this year with 15 decorated trunks handing out candy. Activities included serving food, playing in bounce houses/slides, eight other games (skeeball, bean bag toss, bowling, football toss, ring toss, etc.), decorated cars with candy,

books, and stuffed animals. We had wonderful participation with at least 350 people coming to the event. It was a fantastic outreach event for the community and great fun for all. Here are some of the numbers:

- 15 decorated trunks with bags of donated candy shared with the community
- 250+ books, stuffed animals and toys given to children by volunteers from the Women's Bible Study
- 325 people enjoyed hot dogs, chips and lemonade
- 8 fun games for children we gave out over 500 prizes
- 60+ volunteers (including a helpful group from UTA) and many others who donated candy!
- 300+ people received information regarding the upcoming 2020 census

Mitten Tree and Dove Tree – Members donated mittens, hats, socks, and other clothing items on and under the Mitten Tree. The donated items included 41 pairs of mittens/gloves, 21 hats, 28 pairs of socks, 3 pairs of underwear, 1 shirt, and 1 bear(toy). These items were collected and delivered to Arlington Charities.

Teacher Appreciation Events

- End of School Appreciation Breakfast A Teacher Appreciation Breakfast was served at Carter Junior High in May 2019. The Bible Study Sunday School coordinated with much help from other Sunday School classes. FPCA member provided breakfast items and volunteers again served breakfast for 100 teachers and staff.
- Back to School Appreciation Breakfast A Teacher Appreciation Breakfast was served at Carter Junior High school in August 2019. The Friendship class provided food and volunteers for the breakfast. We served breakfast for 100 teachers and staff. Community donations were made by McDonalds, Shipley Donuts, and Starbucks.
- Preschool Teacher Appreciation Gathering— A Teacher Appreciation Gathering was served in the Parlor for our Preschool teachers and staff in May 2019. Many members donated fruit, crackers, veggies and desserts to share. The gathering was attended by teachers and staff from the Preschool and FPCA members.

Thank you to all members who donated time, money or baked goods for these outreach events. These teachers devote much time to educate children, these events allow us an opportunity show our appreciation for their dedication.

H.O.P.E. Tutoring – H.O.P.E. Tutoring is a continuing program to provide free tutoring to children in grades 3 through 8 in a safe learning environment. FPCA hosts a site for tutoring on Tuesday and Thursday evenings for neighborhood students. In addition to supplying the facility, many church members volunteer their time to serve as tutors for students.

Box Tops – Beginning in the summer 2017 and continuing through 2019, FPCA officially collected Box Tops for Carter Jr. High and Blanton Elementary schools. There are drop boxes located at Fellowship Hall and the front office on Sunday mornings, ready to receive your box tops. Beginning in 2020, Box Tops will be collected electronically via a mobile app, so we will begin to phase out the drop boxes. During the 2018-2019 school year, FPCA collected about 850 Box Tops for a total of \$85 for Blanton Elementary and Carter Junior High. Box Tops 4 Education provides funding to specific schools based on the number of product box tops that are collected. A list of products with box tops is available at www.boxtops4education.com. Please consider collecting and bringing your box tops to FPCA during 2020.

Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services (PCHAS) - FPCA continues to support PCHAS through special offerings and direct financial contributions annually. Additionally, FPCA sponsored the 34th annual trip for PCHAS students to attend a Texas Ranger baseball game. This year just over 30 youth and staff from the Itasca Group Home, 9 people from the Foster Agency, and 9 people from the Waxahachie Single Parent Family homes came for came for Sunday School, worship, lunch and the game – September 29th - Rangers versus Yankees. The Fellowship Team served a Summer Celebration BBQ dinner prior to the game. We all celebrated together as we attended the last Ranger baseball game in the Ballpark!

Gifts of Hope 2019 - Gifts of Hope 2019 was a great success! This program allows participants to provide a gift of a donation to others for Christmas. This Christmas, 28 medical kit donations, 13 ducks, 16 chickens, 5 fruit trees, 6 soccer balls, 5 blankets for rescued slaves, 9 care kits for child victims, 4 care kits for persecuted Christians, 6 Bibles for believers in captive nations, food for 30 Arlington families for a week, 14 sets of winter items for the homeless, 7 paperback books, 4 reams of paper for H.O.P.E. Tutoring, toiletries for a month for 23 children in foster care, and 9 school backpacks for students in

need were given. Donations will be given to World Vision, International Justice Mission, Voice of the Martyrs, Arlington Charities, H.O.P.E. Tutoring, and Presbyterian Children's Home and Services. The total donated for alternative gifts was \$1,719.50. Thanks so much to everyone who contributed!

Fred Kurz Memorial Scholarship – Christina Moore from Austin Theological Seminary was the 2019 recipient of the Fred Kurz Memorial Fund Scholarship. Christina has received a \$1,000 scholarship from the fund. She is currently attending Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary where she is pursuing her Master's degree with a focus in youth ministry. Christina's home church is Forest Hills Presbyterian in Helotes, Texas. She attended High School in San Antonio and received her bachelor's degree from University of Texas at San Antonio. Upon graduation from seminary, Christina hopes to receive a call to a church.

National Ministries

Special Offerings - Several Special Offerings were held throughout the year: One Great Hour of Sharing; Pentecost Offering; Presbyterian Children's Homes Offering; and the Joy Offering.

International Ministries

Belize Mission Trip – FPCA members returned to Belize for the eleventh year in 2019. A total of 8 volunteers (4 adults and 4 youth) traveled to Belize during the week of spring break. They continued building relationships at Youth Enhancement Services (YES) through work at the Student Training center and the Teen Mother's center. The team interacted daily with students and mothers through worship, bible study, and craft activities. We also organized a field trip for students and teen mothers. In addition to the relational ministry, the team helped YES with maintenance by painting the siding on three sides of a classroom building (this is the siding that we installed in 2018).

Belize Shipping Container – In January 2019, several members traveled over to Fort Worth in order to be the hands and feet of the Lord. They volunteered to assist individuals from The Word At Work to load a shipping container with donated items. We are grateful for these members who donated time to load supplies destined for Hospice in Belize.

Brett and Marla Shideler, Wycliffe Bible Translators – Brett and Marla have been with Wycliffe since 1993. Their current assignments find them working remotely from their home in the Pacific Northwest. Brett serves as the Vice President of Staff Care and Resources while Marla serves as an Associate Director on the Care Team. Brett's role is to provide supervision and guidance to 135 people working on nine teams. These teams are responsible for Member Care and Human Resources support for 3,500 Wycliffe members working worldwide. Brett is one of seven Vice Presidents who oversee the daily operations of Wycliffe USA. As part of the Wycliffe leadership team, the Vice Presidents participate in setting the direction of Wycliffe's future Bible translation activities.

Marla's assignment as an Associate Director for the Care Team has her providing supervision for four Resource Coordinators as well personally supporting 23 families and unmarried Wycliffe members. Marla also oversees a team that is responsible for revising and editing "workflows" that document processes and procedures that are critical to providing care for Wycliffe members.

In financial and prayer partnership with Brett and Marla in 2019, FPCA is making a difference to 1.5 billion people, speaking 6665 languages, who still do not have the full Bible in their first language and to the 171 million people, speaking 2115 languages, who are still waiting for translation work to begin. Your partnership makes the Shidelers' Wycliffe ministry possible!

Michelle Craig – Michelle Craig is a current member of FPCA who served the Lord and our church over many years as an elder, deacon, worship leader, personnel chair, youth leader, Sunday School teacher, and teacher of mission. In 2019, Michelle returned to Texas and worked to pursue the experience necessary to fulfill the airplane mechanics training. This training is essential for her call to mission aviation. The M&E Team continues to pray and support Michelle during this time of study.

Matthew and Teresa Lee, Wycliffe Bible Translators – During 2019, Matthew and Teresa Lee, Wycliffe missionaries to Cameroon, found themselves back in North Texas while Matthew finished classwork for a master's degree. Matthew and Teresa attended FPCA prior to their time in Cameroon and we were happy to have them return to worship services and Sunday School during 2019. Matthew supports the language translation efforts via his work with translation software and computer programs. Teresa teaches children of missionaries in Cameroon. While here, Teresa has been a substitute teacher in our preschool. The M&E Team remains very grateful for Matthew and Teresa's commitment and calling. School Updates

First Presbyterian Preschool is in the forty-ninth year of serving the congregation and community through our nationally accredited program, and look forward to celebrating fifty years in 2021. We are now in the second semester of school year 2019-2020. Our operating hours are 6:45AM until 6:00PM Monday through Friday and Summer Camp is extended to cover all summer weeks except one when we have in-service and prepare rooms for the coming school year.

Students, teachers, and guests use the newly installed ramp at our north door often. It leads to the playground and parking lot and we are so excited about the new roof, being installed currently. When days are too cold, too hot, or too wet, we play in the Fellowship Hall and the children love to build and experiment with the big blue blocks and ride Big Wheels trikes.

The Preschool Team welcomed Alecia Rodriguez and said good bye to Valerie Cavanagh, because her daughter graduated. We meet the second Wednesday of every month, excluding July, at 5:15PM. Our meetings are held in the Bride's Room.

Our teachers are well qualified, caring, passionate educators who love God and have lots of energy. We have one infant class, one toddler class, one two year old class, two three year old classes, and one four year old class. We also have before and after school programs for infants through pre-k. FPPS offers Spanish, Music, and Chapel every week and each Friday is Science day.

We have forty-seven children currently enrolled and fifteen staff members in our program. We work hard to recruit new families through our new website (fppsarlington.com), Facebook, community relations, Summer Camp, and by being part of a Christian Directors networking group. Our new website is our strongest tool and word of mouth also serves us well. The preschool has secured a place with a governmental agency that assists low income families called Child Care Management Services. This program enables us to carry our ministry to our surrounding community, low income families, and positions us for other programs that would benefit our school through education and equipment. This program has led us to be included in Texas Rising Star at the highest ranking of four stars. We were just awarded national accreditation by the national accreditation commission, (NAC) through February 2023.

The Preschool Team is considering adjusting the holiday schedule so that the school will provide care more days primarily during Spring Break, Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. We would like to be in a position to accommodate parents who work during these times.

After what will be six years, Sandra Ybarra the preschool director, has turned in her resignation effective June 4, the last day of the school-year. A committee is being formed to search for her replacement.

Sense of Community

Our Team continues to work towards building community within our school. We have an annual back-to-school picnic, teacher appreciation, two programs per year, an art show, and Summer Camp. We also host a rodeo, track and field day, graduation and Open House.

Our Spring and Christmas programs are times when students sing and perform for their families in the sanctuary. After the Christmas program, everyone gathers in the Fellowship Hall for cookies with Santa and after the Spring program, we gather in the Fellowship Hall again for the annual Spring Fundraiser.

Our parent-led fundraiser is scheduled for May14 directly following the Spring Program. This fundraiser has proven to be a great way for families to get involved and to raise money for the school.

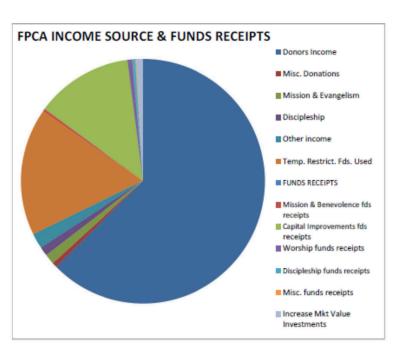

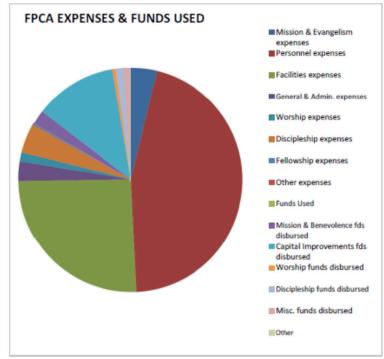
