Comments for Contemplation

TRANSFORM – The Change To Which Jesus Calls Us Committing our Lives to Christ/Being a Living Sacrifice

1 Chronicles 21:24; Romans 12:1-2; Matthew 16:24-26

- 1. In the time of Jesus, this city was known as Caesarea Philippi, and that is where the exchange in Matthew, chapter 16, takes place. It may have looked something like this second picture (2) when Jesus and his disciples were there. Faithful Jews normally avoided this area because of the wide variety of pagan rituals and sinful practices of the bizarre religions that worshiped here. But Jesus intentionally brought his disciples to this place to ______ himself to them as the Lord's Messiah.
- 2. Jesus then gives them one the most paradoxical and yet profound lessons ever taught in history. He told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it." If you were hearing that for the first time, what would you be thinking? Wait, we don't get a prominent position in your kingdom, Jesus? We have to deny ourselves, rather than ______ ourselves, and what do you mean by taking up a cross?
- 3. But let's not be blind. Rest assured that you are not the only one pulling. God is faithful, and many of us are listening to Him. For four years we have talked about needing to do a capital campaign to repair, refurbish, renew and re-do this wonderful building that I call our ______ station. Now the time has come to do it, so we can reach out to new generation.
- 4. King David understood that giving to the Lord's work was a matter of the heart, and it was costly, and required involvement and sacrifice from the giver. David insisted on paying full price for the things a man named Ornan wanted to donate for sacrifice. David said to Ornan, "I will not take for the Lord what is yours, nor offer burnt offerings that ______ me nothing."
- 5. Friends: the Lord is calling us to be living sacrifices, who live out our commitment to God in our everyday lives, caring for others, losing our lives for Jesus, offering not animals, but our very selves, souls and bodies for the sake of the gospel. We are to be transformed, not by the ______ of our minds, but by the renewing of our minds, so that we can truly discern God's will, which is good and acceptable and perfect, unlike our own wills.
