

Perfect Faith

Romans 16:25–27; Luke 1:26–38

| 1. | Many Christians simply try to keep their faith in a place where it doesn't get too intrusive in their lives. They limit their commitment to Christ, and as a result, they also limit what they can hear and receive from God. They are not prepared and not in the right to receive all that God has for them. |

| 2. | I hear the Lord speaking to me through Scripture, I hear the Lord speaking to me through prayer by the Holy Spirit, I hear the Lord speaking to me through other people and especially other Christians, I hear the Lord speaking to me through experience and and then in other ways where I have no experience and in ways many people think is unreasonable. |
| 3. | Mary, the mother of Jesus was a person, who by her faith, changed the course of history. It is fair to say that if Mary had not responded in faith to Gabriel's message, we would not be here today, and the one-third of the world that claims to believe in our Lord Jesus Christ would be dramatically different. But, by the grace of God, Mary did respond in faith and offers us the ultimate example of faith. In fact, Mary is a example of how we are to receive God's love. |
