You Should Forgive Your Kids

"I sorry." When those words are delivered by the high-pitched voice of a child, they melt you. Of course I'll forgive you, you think. How could I not?

Even if there is a huge mess behind her.

Bookcases are knocked over.

The dog is barking.

The cat is perched on top of the chandelier.

A team of people are unrolling "condemned tape" across your house.

But when you hear "I sorry" and see those big brown eyes, the anger and frustration lessen a little bit. Sure, they may be staring at a corner for a while or be contained in their room, but you'll forgive them. There's a reason God makes them so cute at that age.

But as they grow older, "sorry" gets a little more difficult to digest.

Like when your middle schooler looks you in the face and lies.

Or when she says she's going one place, and ends up at another.

Or you stumble across a social media account and find your child has been bashing you.

Or your high schooler wrecks the car.

Or in a teenage hormonal rage, he or she took a verbal shot at your most vulnerable point.

There are times when your child's actions will feel more personal.

There are moments when their words will cut you deeply.

And you'll find yourself in a unique position.

You may not want to forgive them.

In fact, it will feel as painful, if not more, as the betrayal of a close friend.

You'll be sad.

You'll be mad.

You'll feel like a failure.

You'll feel like they've failed you.

You'll wonder if you can ever trust them again.

You may find yourself scrambling, wondering where do we go from here?

Forgiveness won't come so easily.

Those big brown eyes won't make it all go away.

Your child should have known better.

He or she should have made different choices.

The pangs of guilt, preying on your own parental insecurities, will whisper in the back of your head.

I wish I could offer an easy answer here.

But when you are that hurt, one thing becomes painfully clear, forgiving is a choice.

And so you have to choose to forgive.

It doesn't mean there aren't consequences for their actions.

Or that trust isn't damaged.

But you choose to forgive.

Because if you don't, it will destroy you.

And it will destroy your relationship with your child.

You choose to forgive the hurt.

You choose to forgive the disappointment.

You choose to extend grace.

And you also choose to be wise. To have perspective on the situation and be the grownup. You try to determine what needs to happen differently to avoid being in that situation again.

You teach.

You guide.

Even when your heart is grieving.

I don't think there's ever been a time I identified more with the heart of God than when my child did or said something that wounded me, and I still chose to forgive.

And when I do, I also show my child how to forgive. Because when we have experienced forgiveness, it makes it easier to forgive.

I don't want to turn this into a place to rant, or even a forum to vent about what your teen did. So I'm going to ask some simple questions that may be helpful to other parents of teens:

What are some ways you personally have chosen to forgive your child? How did you take "the high road" and forgive even when you were hurting?

A Praise and Prayer from the Shideler`s

Jesus did many other things as well. If every one of them were written down, I suppose that even the whole world would not have room for the books that would be written. John 21:25

This is the closing verse of the Gospel of John. Marla enjoyed studying her way through John via a women's group that met weekly via Zoom. While the study ended in April, she had a wonderful time in the Word as she renewed long-time friendships and made new friends along the way. She recently met with a Wycliffe member who was displaced from her place of service due to COVID concerns in her country of service. The member told Marla that John 21:25 is one of a Bible translator's favorite verses. Why is that? When this translation team reached the last verse of the last chapter of John they were ready to celebrate! One member of the team, when pondering over how many other books John says might have been written, marveled aloud to the rest of the team, "We would NEVER finish the translation"?

Reading, studying, and being transformed by God's Word is an integral part of our relationship with Him. Our continuing passion is to serve as part of the team making it possible for other language groups to read His Word in a language that speaks best to them. Thank you for praying for us and our Wycliffe ministry!

- **Brett** had energy to press through and complete the March meetings at Wycliffe's US headquarters in Orlando. He also enjoyed a wonderful weekend in Tallahassee with son Adam, daughter-in-law Christina, and grandson Edward;
- Marla was blessed to recently clear TWO "units" (one couple and one single) to return to their places of assignment. She is also providing member care to a family who is transitioning back to life in the US, and to three others who are facing challenging situations of various kinds.

If you'd like to pray for us, here's what's going on...

Wycliffe USA is in the middle of a planned (since March 2019) review of the teams and processes involved in serving its members. As the review has progressed, two Vice President roles within Wycliffe USA were brought to an end; including Brett's role as Vice President of Staff Care and Resources. Soon after this role ended, God opened other doors for ministry within Bible Translation with Brett just accepting the role of Special Projects with the SIL Global HR Team. He will be serving again with Wycliffe's partner organization, SIL International. (You may remember that while we were in Cameroon from 1993 to 2007 we served with SIL International.) He will start this new position on 12 July. Please pray as he prepares to take on his new responsibilities that will include serving as a point of contact for partner organizations around the world (including Wycliffe USA) and SIL International's Care and Wellbeing team while he uses his experience in member care to

serve the global community. It truly is a widening of responsibility and we covet your prayers as he moves forward in his preparations.
