
This American gospel song became popular in England in the late 19th century, then returned to this country in the mid-20th century with the Billy Graham crusades. Its continuing popularity may well be due to the freedom from subjective considerations in its praise of God.

Jesus, Thou Joy of Loving Hearts 494



This 19th-century American translation of stanzas from a longer Latin poem is so well shaped that it sounds like an original meditation on Christian experience centered on the Lord's Supper. The North American tune name seems not to have originated with the English composer.

A Grateful Heart





This paraphrase of Psalm 111 preserves the psalm's quality of providing a general list of God's praiseworthy characteristics rather than giving thanks for a particular act of deliverance. In the original text these attributes are organized as an acrostic on the Hebrew alphabet.

The Rest of the Story Acts 27:1–2, 13–15, 21, 25; Acts 28:16–31

Paul's Example of what Commitment in the Church Involves:

- 1) Additional problems
- 2) Assurance in the storms
- 3) Dedicating one's life to what is eternal

Possible Reasons for Luke's Ending:

- 1) The author died before finishing his work
- 2) The book was written during Paul's two years in Rome and had caught up to current events
- 3) Theophilus already knew what happened
- 4) Luke was planning a third volume that would include the trial
- 5) The ending is perfect because the main purpose was to account for the spread of Christianity from Jerusalem to Rome

ONECopOne Congregation One Precinct

The Arlington Police Department was invited to be part the national OneCOP program this year and FPCA is excited to join APD as a faith community partner.

OneCOP is Movement Forward's signature program and is facilitating positive, ongoing partnerships between local law enforcement agencies and diverse congregations of every faith across the USA. The national program was founded in 2015 and has added three police departments across the nation to the program each year. FPCA has been assigned Brian Trowbridge from the APD East Precinct as our partner in OneCOP. Brian grew up in Arlington and has been with APD for three years.

The objectives of the OneCOP initiative include increasing community engagement with officers via congregations to decrease biases and increase familiarity, mutual respect and trust. By doing so we can improve public safety by working together and sharing information to combat crime and violence. OneCOP creates direct links between law enforcement and community leaders in an effort to prevent violent crime, and to give the public a voice in community concerns relative to policing and police reform.
