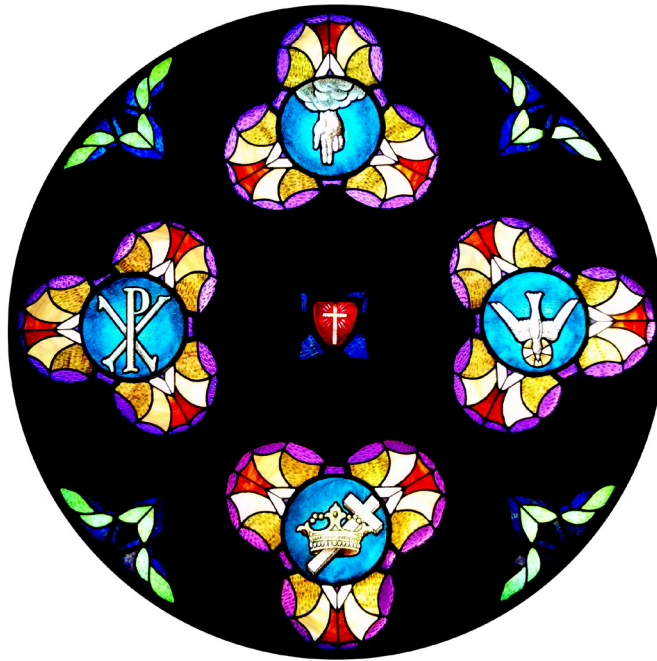

This 20th-century text was written by a Presbyterian layperson and poet, who in her later years became interested in writing hymns for the seasons of the church year and prepared a collection of them for her congregation. It pairs effectively with this sturdy Welsh tune.

You Can Help A Child: Be A Mentor or Prayer Partner

You can encourage a child, let them know that someone cares about them, and help them develop social skills by being a mentor to a student at Blanton Elementary or by being a prayer partner for a mentor and mentee. Mentors meet with the same student once a week almost every week during the school year for an hour or less. The goal is not to tutor the student although you may do a little of that. The goal is to be a consistent adult in the life of the student letting them know that someone cares about them and helping them develop social skills. Mentors do this by doing things like playing games, working on a puzzle, building with legos, reading a book, and visiting with their mentee. Every mentor needs a prayer partner. The prayer partner prays for the mentor and the mentor's mentee throughout the school year. We do all of this through Kids Hope USA which provides online training for mentors and prayer partners. 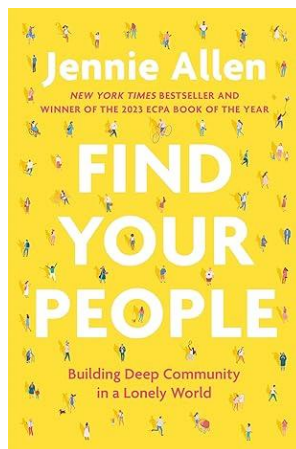
